

EDITORIAL

Spring has arrived at last and during the two months covered by this magazine we can look forward to five days designated as public holidays, more than half the total for the whole year. The May Day public holiday was first introduced in the UK in 1978 but it has always been a constant source of irritation to me that the public holiday is set for the first Monday in May, rather than on the actual First of May. We don't celebrate New Year's Day on the first Monday in January – it's on the First of January regardless of what day of the week that falls on – so why should May Day be any different? May Day has long been an important day of celebration, with many traditional customs taking place throughout the country, heralding the start of summer. Locally, May Morning in Oxford sees crowds gather below Magdalen Tower at 6:00am to witness Magdalen College Choir sing the *Hymnus Eucharisticus* from the top of the tower. This is followed by morris dancing and general merriment around the city centre, all before the shops open. And this year, the first of May does actually fall on the Monday!

A week later we see an extra public holiday added to the normal schedule. This is on Monday, 8th May to mark the Coronation of King Charles III. The coronation itself is on Saturday, 6th May and we can watch this on television, then we have the Sunday and Monday to celebrate the event in our own ways. Village celebrations in Bletchington will take place on the Sunday – then with the Monday being a holiday, for most of us, we won't have to worry about getting up for work or school the next day. A big thank you to Grace and Sue for stepping in to organise our village celebrations. For further details, please see below and poster on inside back cover.

Coronation celebrations

In Bletchington, there are plans afoot to celebrate the Coronation of King Charles III on Sunday 7th May, the day after the actual coronation ceremony. Commencing 3:00pm at the Village Hall there will be an afternoon tea plus games for the children then later we can look forward to live music plus a bar and barbecue. The afternoon tea will be free, but the organisers would like to know how many people are coming, to ensure they have the right amount of food. Twenty is plenty

You may have noticed that, after much campaigning, 20mph signs were finally erected around the village on 16th March, making Bletchington officially a 20mph zone. Please be good enough to respect the new speed limits and, as the sign upon entering the village says: "Please Drive Carefully".

Defibrillators

We have two defibrillators available in the village, located at the Village Hall, on the side nearest to the Co-op and at the Sports & Social Club. To access these devices, you will need to call 999 to obtain a code whilst also requesting an ambulance. Instructions on how to use the defibrillators and how to keep the patient safe are posted close by. Your prompt action before the ambulance arrives may save a life.

Bus 24 timetable - Anne Maclachlan, Parish Transport Representative, writes:

Bus service 24 has now completed its first month of operation, however it has become clear that the timetable as originally designed is not achievable. Some sections of the route do not have sufficient time to be completed (most notably between Kirtlington and Weston-on-the-Green, and between Weston-on-the-Green and Wendlebury) and increased congestion is causing delays on arrivals into Oxford. This time cannot be made up throughout the day and drivers are currently not receiving the breaks they are legally entitled to. In order to remain compliant with relevant legislation the revised timetable has been agreed between the County Council and Grayline buses after wider consultation.

The main changes to the timetable are:

- Earlier departures on morning peak journeys into Oxford to ensure sufficient time to complete the journeys
- Slightly widened spaces between buses in the daytime
- Slightly later departures in the afternoon peak journeys from Oxford
- Changes to Saturday afternoon journeys, including the combining the final two journeys from Oxford into one

The changes are necessary to ensure compliance with the law and to avoid problems retaining driving staff. It is hoped that these changes will lead to better punctuality and happier drivers.

When the new service started, Grayline agreed that they would offer £2 fares up to 31st March. Now that the national scheme has been extended, OCC are encouraging Grayline to participate in the government scheme beyond this date, but this has not yet been agreed.

The revised timetable, shown opposite, is effective from Monday 3rd April. Note: not all bus stops are listed in this timetable.

Other local bus service changes

The 2/2A bus service (Oxford–Kidlington) now calls at the forecourt at Oxford Parkway Station. Meanwhile the route 7 service (Oxford–Woodstock) has been renumbered S7 and is now extended beyond Woodstock to Witney via Long Hanborough. This no longer pulls into the station forecourt.

Local council elections – Voter ID required

Be sure that you don't lose your vote! Local council elections are scheduled to take place on Thursday 4th May. Please note that, for the first time, voter ID will be required at polling stations. Acceptable forms of ID include passport, driving licence, blue badge, defence identity card, various travel passes and other options. For a full, detailed list of ID options, visit Cherwell District Council's website, select 'Elections' then select 'Voter ID' where a complete list of acceptable ID is shown. In all cases, the ID must include a photograph but documents that have expired are acceptable for use as ID at polling stations provided the photograph is clearly recognisable as that of the holder.

If you do not have a suitable identification document, then you should apply for a Voter Authority Certificate. Don't delay - the deadline to apply for such a certificate is 5:00pm on Tuesday, 25th April. Apply on-line at:

www.electoralcommission.org.uk/voterID

then select **Register to vote**. There are some straightforward questions to answer, and you will also be required to provide your National Insurance number and attach a digital passport-type photograph of yourself. Applications for a Voter Authority Certificate may also be made by post, but you will have to complete a form which is obtainable from above web page so, if you can, ask a friend or neighbour to download and print the relevant form for you. If you do not have access to a computer, please telephone **0800 328 0280**.

FROM THE RECTOR

Dear friends,

My phone has a habit of showing me clips from old comedy programmes. I don't know how or why it does it (I guess I must have googled something once), but I must say I am very grateful for them. When a day is proving particularly testing, there's no better tonic than three minutes of *Fawlty Towers, The Two Ronnies*, or *The Vicar of Dibley*. Speaking of which..... it does sometimes feel as if Dibley is not such a fictional place after all!

One of the Dibley episodes is called "Spring". It's time for Alice and Hugo's baby to be christened. As Geraldine is one of the godparents, the Bishop arrives to perform the ceremony. Somewhat surprisingly David proposes marriage to Geraldine, who says that she will consider it. However, after Sean Bean has appeared to her in a dream telling her not to go through with it, she turns David down!

Life certainly has its disappointments! Not to mention things that give us cause to worry. A friend and I were chatting the other day, and noting all the anxieties in people's lives — Ukraine, climate change, the cost of living, the NHS, social media, etc. He felt that a lot of these big anxieties are manifesting in our personal interactions, and I think he may have a point. However, new life has a habit of popping up despite the evidence to the contrary, like the crocuses poking their heads through the unexpected March snow as I write. Tom Wright, the New Testament commentator, believes that Jesus was funnier than he comes across in our English translations! And Easter is God's supreme joke - that, despite all the evidence to the contrary, death does not have the last word. As someone once said, "We are an Easter people, and Alleluia is our song." However dark things may seem, however tough the going, perhaps we can find a space in the day to say an alleluia, however soft it might sound.

Community tree planting

The proposal to plant a community wood or orchard as part of the late Queen's Green Canopy was backed by the Parish Council last year. Unfortunately, the project has lost momentum for a while as most of the participants do not have sufficient capacity at this time.

A group of us from the village came together with a sense of purpose and enthusiasm last summer to discuss where and what could be developed as a community space in nature for the enjoyment and well-being of residents in the village. We want it to be easily accessible to all, and to enhance the biodiversity in the parish, providing a space to enjoy planting and maintaining trees and wildflower areas, and to linger and relax and appreciate nature.

The group has assembled some useful resources such as the Oxfordshire Treescape Project Opportunity Report for Bletchingdon Parish, and made some useful connections with other groups and villages.

Having established that the parish owns very little unutilised land, we acknowledge the need to work very closely with local landowners. We have considered potential sites bearing in mind the proximity to the village and the natural shape and quality of the landscape and the soil. We also discussed options such as rows of trees along a border or hedgerow, or something more like a woodland glade.

Since then, Bletchingdon has begun to develop its Neighbourhood Plan. We hope that this will provide a framework for further action when we have capacity to continue with a community tree planting project, protecting and enhancing nature around us.

History Corner

Coronations

From William I in 1066 to King Charles III on 6th May this year, Westminster Abbey has hosted this country's coronations for almost a thousand years. The coronation ceremony has its origins in Europe and dates back well before 1066 as Kings were crowned in a religious based ceremony marking a time when the church was becoming increasingly involved in the running of the state. This country has always been big on maintaining traditions and of the remaining monarchies in Europe, Britain is the only one which retains this lavish ceremony.

The earliest known coronations in Britain, involved Anglo Saxon rulers and took place in various locations, with Bath Abbey, for example, being used for the coronation of Edgar in 973 AD with the ceremony devised by the then Archbishop of Canterbury who was later canonised as St. Dunstan. Since the Norman Conquest, Westminster Abbey has become the regular venue for coronations, beginning with that of William I, on Christmas Day, 1066, following his successful invasion of Britain which resulted in him seizing the crown. This ceremony is depicted in the Bayeux Tapestry.

Westminster Abbey was rebuilt in a Gothic style from 1245, under the reign of Henry III. The first King to be crowned in the present Abbey was Edward I in 1274. The first Protestant coronation was that of King Edward VI, at the age of just nine, in 1547, conducted by Thomas Cranmer, Archbishop of Canterbury, but when Edward was succeeded by his half-sister, Mary I, first Queen to be crowned in her own right, the Catholic rite was temporarily restored. In 1603, upon the death of Queen Elizabeth I, the Union of the Crowns saw King James VI of Scotland become King James I of England. At his coronation, the service, which had previously been delivered in Latin, was translated to English for the first time, although the Latin version had to be brought back for George I in 1714 as the Hanoverian king did not speak English so Latin was seen as an appropriate common language.

The first coronation televised live was that of Queen Elizabeth II in 1953, watched by an estimated audience of 27 million in the UK, plus millions more overseas. When the Queen passed away in September 2022, Charles immediately became king, but it is the normal practice the coronation to take place some time later. This is due to the celebratory nature of the event which would be inappropriate too soon after the death of the previous monarch, the nation still being in morning. It also allows time for the necessary preparations to be made. Watch the coronation live on TV on Saturday 6th May, then come along and enjoy our community celebrations on the following day.

Recycle with carrier bags at your local store, not kerbside

How many times have you read this instruction, or something very similar, and wondered what it means? We're very keen on recycling at home, as I hope are most if not all of our readers, and are anxious to do the right thing.

Cherwell has an excellent reputation for recycling, and I rather hoped that if I put all our recyclable plastic in the blue bin then the council would be able to sort it into 'bag plastic' and other types. Otherwise we would have yet another bag of recyclable plastic cluttering up our already cluttered kitchen, or outside in the rain. And then you have to remember to take it with you to the Co-op or Sainsbury's or wherever, and inevitably forget time after time. So we've been putting it all in the blue bin.

But the other day I read the instruction again and in a fit of guilt mixed with curiosity I rang up Cherwell DC Recycling and enquired how and why the system is meant to work. I got a surprising answer, but also a convenient solution.

So: Don't mix the different plastics in your blue bin, as they are difficult to separate from each other. Put all the usual recyclable plastics, with paper, cardboard etc in your blue bin, except the 'bag plastic'. Instead, put the bag plastic in the bin at the Co-op/Sainsbury's or in the green bin with all your other rubbish, which all gets sorted after collection anyway, when separating bag plastics from the rest of the rubbish is a lot easier than sorting from other plastics.

As they say, SORTED!

London Road level crossing

Some of you have asked how this is progressing, and the sorry answer is, very slowly. We are committed to keeping the crossing open to avoid cutting off half of Bicester and requiring people to go round the ring road to get to the other side of town. There are several options which keep coming to the table, yet no decision has yet been made. These include an overpass or underpass for pedestrians and vehicles, or a cycle and foot bridge only. There are more consultations planned, and we meet regularly with EWR to question them on this. We have support from OCC members on this as well. This missed opportunity when the Bicester Town station was re-developed is a real pain point for all us and we will continue to represent your views on this and push to a resolution, with a recent motion passed at the full Council meeting in February.

Local housing land supply and the Local Plan

As we mentioned last month, the Local Plan came before the Leadership Executive committee at CDC and a decision was postponed indefinitely while they considered comments from the Overview and Scrutiny committee. No change there I am afraid, however one positive development (no pun intended) to note is a new Housing Land Supply figure was agreed. The UK government requires councils to plan for and accommodate a housing land supply that exceeds 5 years. Essentially calculating the number of houses needed and the amount of land available in the area. We have been short on that figure, 3.5 years, and so speculative development has been fairly rampant, including in Launton, as developers point at this and say "you need to build these houses anywhere". The CDC Executive recently passed a revised land supply figure of 5.4 years due to a number of recent changes. Pending ratification by HM Planning Inspectorate, this will close that "loophole" and should make this development much more difficult to approve.

Kirtlington & Bletchington Historical Society



The variety of subject-matter at the society's meetings was well demonstrated in January and February. The January talk by Carol Anderson, Over the Hills to Glory, focused on the womenfolk of wretchedly poor, striking farm labourers in the small Oxfordshire village of Ascott-under-Wychwood at a time of agricultural depression in the 1870s. After several weeks of no labour, the workers' principal employer imported two young men to plant one of his fields. The wives, mothers and sisters of the strikers picketed the field to dissuade them from working there. Sixteen of the women, two with babies, were arrested, prosecuted and given short sentences to include hard labour at Oxford Gaol. This

heavy-handed treatment caused an outcry including a near riot in Chipping Norton involving perhaps 2,000 people which led to questions in the Commons. The Home Secretary intervened to commute the hard labour and, on release, the women returned in triumph to their village. Sadly, there was no long-term improvement in agricultural sector wages and a number of the families involved emigrated over the next few years. But the story of the bravery and unjust treatment of the so-called **Ascott Martyrs** endures.

In **February**, art-historian and writer **James Hamilton** gave a highly illustrated talk on the life of the British artist, **John Constable**, based on his recently-published biography. He described Constable's long struggle to get elected to the Royal Academy, an honour which his contemporaries like Turner and Wilkie achieved at a much younger age. At a time when fashion favoured portraiture or mythical and historical scenes, Constable's preference for close observation of the countryside featuring ordinary people made little impact on the artistic establishment.



Even when he finally became a member of this establishment. Constable once demonstrated how unfashionable his work was by submitting one of his landscapes anonymously to a selection committee of which he was himself a member only to have it rejected by his colleagues. Once they discovered it was by him, they changed their minds, but he insisted they stick to their original view. Dr Hamilton argued successfully that whereas we now think of Constable as the high-priest of conservative nostalgia, in his own time he was a real radical, promoting landscape as a subject in its own right rather than as a theatrical backdrop to more high-flown ideas, and thereby paving the way for the Impressionists.

BLETCHINGTON SPORTS & SOCIAL CLUB

Bletchington Sports & Social Club is situated at the end of the drive in the playing field on Oxford Road. The Sports field used to be located in the grounds of Bletchington Park. It moved to the current location which was owned by Lord Valentia and was rented to the village to use for football and cricket. In the 1960s Lord Rotherwick generously donated the land to the village. The original clubhouse was described as "a very basic structure". The first bar was opened on 19th March 1978 by Mr Arthur Eeley. The go-ahead to build the current clubhouse was given by the committee in 1980 at a cost of £50,000 and was extended around ten years ago adding the veranda and scorebox.

The club is self-funded and run entirely by volunteers from the village. We offer memberships throughout the year that are renewed on 1st September. Memberships cost just £15 for a family, £10 for an individual and £5 for senior citizens and U18's. You are more than welcome to come in for a drink.

We currently have 4 youth football teams (U16, U13, U10 & U9), 3 Cricket Teams, 2 Bar Billiards Teams, 3 Darts Teams, a Quiz Team, Aunt Sally, and a Cribbage Team who all base themselves at the Club. We also have a very active social committee who regularly host Bingo, Live Music and other events that are generally free admission and open to everyone. We have Sky Sports, Darts, Pool and a Billiards Table. We generally open for any major televised sporting events.

Our opening hours vary during the week, but we are always open from 7:30pm on Friday and Saturday evenings. More details can be found on our Facebook page. Please join our Facebook page for details of opening hours and events.





We are able to offer use of the clubhouse outside of normal hours for Private Events such as Christenings and Funeral Wakes. If you would like to make use of the facilities drop into the club or make contact with a member of the committee to check availability. We can also accommodate parties during normal opening times, but members will still be permitted to use the bar.

There is a public footpath that runs from Oxford Road through the sports field. If you use this, we would be grateful if you could keep dogs on leads and clean up behind them. This helps us keep the area safe for the children and sports teams that use the facilities.

We have also experienced some damage to the clubhouse where ball games have been played against the building. These are costly repairs, and we respectfully ask that this is avoided.

Men's Darts: The team play in the King's Arms Invitation League on Wednesday evenings and are currently in 3rd place in the Singles league and 4th place in the Pairs.

Ladies Darts: The Wednesday night team currently sit in 3rd place with 2 games to go in the Premier and Section 1 League of the Oxford and District Darts Association League.

Bletchington Nomads – Quiz Team: Two weeks to go in the Oxfordshire Quiz League winter season and the Nomads haven't disgraced themselves in their first season in the Premiership. Results in the past few weeks have included victories over two top Premiership sides, one of which ended the 22-match unbeaten run of champions elect, the Ploughman's Bunch! No trophies but still a successful season.

The Online Quiz League season also approaches its end and a safe midtable finish looks likely for the Nomads. They are the second highest scorers in the division but seem to bring out the best in the opposition.

Bar Billiards: Playing in the Witney & District Bar Billiards League, the "A" Team led by Pete Soanes have won Division 1 - congratulations to them. The "B" Team are currently 3rd in Division 2 with Scott Gillam at the helm.

Cribbage: The crib team play their games on Monday evenings from September to June. The team consists of six local players, with additional players available when necessary, and have been playing together for the last 7 years. Originally based at the Rock of Gibraltar in Enslow, the team relocated to the Sports & Social Club in 2019 when the pub closed. The team consists of 3 pairs, competing in the Witney & District Crib League, which consists of two sections of 20 teams covering an area from Bampton to Bletchingdon and all points in between! There are also a number of cup competitions throughout the season. Since its creation the team have been fortunate to win several trophies and are currently sitting third in the league, with a few games in hand, so are hoping to add the league title (again) to their achievements.

The game of crib, or to give it its formal name of cribbage, is known to date back to the 17th Century. It is mentioned in Charles Dickens' Old Curiosity Shop and was also popular among prospectors in the American West (the small mining town of Nelson, Montana, to this day has a sign proclaiming it the "Cribbage Capital of the World"!). The objective of the game is to be the first player/pair to score a target of 121 points. Points, recorded on the crib board, are scored for showing certain jacks, playing the last card, for card combinations adding up to 15 or 31, and for pairs, triples, quadruples (cards the same), runs and flushes.

Like many other older 'pub' games it is usually played by adults in their later years (most of our team were taught by their grandparents when they were younger), and as youngsters find other means of entertainment this results in very little 'fresh blood' coming into the game. <u>'Their Finest Hour' Collections Day</u> aims to preserve Second World War memories

- Share your family's Second World War stories and objects to be digitized for an online archive
- Opening from 11am 3pm, Saturday 1st April 2023
- Museum Open Day free admission to the museum throughout the day
- See Second World War living history displays, kit displays, and art exhibitions in the museum galleries

Soldiers of Oxfordshire Museum (SOFO) is looking for people to bring their stories and objects relating to the Second World War to their Digital Collection Day at the museum in Woodstock on 1st April 2023 from 11am - 3pm. The event is part of a nationwide campaign organised by 'Their Finest Hour', a team based at the University of Oxford and funded by the National Lottery Heritage Fund, which is collecting and preserving the everyday stories and objects of the Second World War. As these stories are fast fading from living memory, it is vital that they - and the wartime objects that often accompany them - are preserved for future generations.

At the Digital Collection Day, stories about your family's wartime experience – and associated objects such as diaries, letters, medals, journals and ration books – will be recorded, digitised, and then uploaded to the 'Their Finest Hour' online archive, which will be free-to-use and launch in June 2024. To encourage even more people to drop in and share their stories, the SOFO Museum will waive its normal admission fee on the day - entry will be free to all on 1st April.

SOFO will also be hosting a range of other Second World War-themed events and exhibitions on the day. Visitors will be able to enjoy displays from 1940s living historians inside the museum, a recently installed replica Anderson Shelter, as well as a number of exhibitions. Attending Living History groups will include Winstan (Churchill), Doing Their Bit (Home Front), Oxfordshire Home Guard and Ham & Jam (Second World War British Airborne troops). Collector John Noott's expansive exhibition, The Art of World War II, will showcase a diverse range of perspectives of the era all produced during the conflict, while the Aces High gallery will have a range of impressive prints - including many signed by veterans - up for sale.

Visitors can talk to museum staff on the day about donating items to the museum's own collection if they wish, but the focus will be on digitisation - photographing objects, recording stories and scanning documents - so original items can remain with their families. Dr Stuart Lee, *Their Finest Hour* project leader, said, "We know from previous projects that people have so many wonderful objects, photos, and anecdotes which have been passed down from family members which are at risk of getting lost or being forgotten. Our aim is to empower local communities to digitally



preserve these stories and objects before they are lost to posterity." The project team is especially interested in collecting contributions from people from underrepresented backgrounds in order to increase the diversity of people benefiting from Second World War heritage.

With often limited parking in Woodstock, Blenheim Palace will also be kindly supporting this event, offering free parking to those attending to share their stories. The museum is just a short walk into town through the palace's Woodstock Town gate.

An online talk, streaming live and on demand from the Woodstock museum's website, will be available from 7pm, 18th April 2023 which will look at the myth and reality behind 'Lawrence of Arabia'. Brigadier (Retired) Hugh Willing CBE will discuss the story of Oxford-educated Thomas Edward Lawrence, popularly known as 'Lawrence of Arabia' for his role in campaigns during the Great War and in the Arab Revolt from 1916-18. Describing Lawrence as an 'unconventional warrior' the talk will try to get to grips with who he really was.

To the war-weary British in 1916, TE Lawrence rapidly became a hero - "Lawrence of Arabia" - the man who seemed a gallant brother to the Arabic people as they fought to gain their freedom from their Turkish overlords in the Ottoman Empire. But were Lawrence's motives as clear-cut as the legend suggests - was he far less interested in the freedom of the Arabs than in the future of Britain as a Middle Eastern power?

For those that watch the event live, Hugh's talk will be followed by a live Q&A session allowing viewers to get their questions answered. Like previous online events SOFO Museum has hosted, the talk will also become available to view on-demand from the following day. Live or on-demand, the talk will remain free to watch but viewers will be encouraged to support the Soldiers of Oxfordshire Museum with a donation. Soldiers of Oxfordshire Trust aims to preserve the county's military heritage for future generations in its archives and museum, and tell stories through events like these.

Oxfordshire Community Land Trust Hits Half a Million Pounds Investment Milestone to Build Affordable Housing

Can it Keep Going?

The Oxfordshire Community Land Trust, a grassroots initiative providing sustainable housing solutions through a Community Land Trust model, has achieved a remarkable milestone – they have raised half a million pounds in investments to fund their very first development to house residents on the Vale of White Horse Housing List.

This ground-breaking achievement means they will now be able to reduce their reliance on costly debt finance, at a time when loan interest rates are rising. Fran Ryan, the Trust's co-founder and secretary said: "I am incredibly proud of OCLT's achievement. We would like to extend our heartfelt gratitude to everyone who has invested in the trust. By investing, we can avoid rising loan interest rates and build more affordable homes for Oxfordshire." OCLT are tackling this problem head-on by providing genuinely affordable housing that will remain affordable forever. Construction of their first development, Crofts Court, is due for completion this Summer. To complete the project and build more affordable homes, they are still looking for investors.

Oxfordshire is in the grip of a severe housing crisis. Average house prices are 15.3x the average salaries, making it the second least affordable city in Britain. Over 900 houses are second homes, and the number of holiday lets is increasing.

This is a unique opportunity to make a positive impact on the community and earn a return on your investment. The Trust has been overwhelmed by the response and is now 108% of their target of £500,000. However, they have extended their deadline and will continue their journey to secure further investment until 12th April 2023. By investing, people can help OCLT create a lasting legacy of permanently affordable homes in Oxfordshire.



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
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
