#### Local election result

On 4<sup>th</sup> May we elected a new councillor to represent the Launton & Otmoor ward, which includes Bletchington, on Cherwell District Council. Results were as follows:

Hughes, David LeonardConservative1,052 votesKarslake, Naomi CeliaLabour315 votesNedelcu, JulianLiberal Democrat1,120 votes

Julian Nedelcu was duly elected to represent our ward on Cherwell District Council for four years. Turnout was 38.66% from an electorate of 6,490. Congratulations to Julian for his election win.

Following these elections, the Conservatives lost their overall majority but remain the largest single party on Cherwell District Council. As the other parties were unable to agree upon a coalition, the Conservatives will continue to run the council as a minority administration.

#### **Chiltern Railways timetable**

Chiltern Railways, which operates train services from Oxford Parkway Station, in common with other train operators, introduced a new timetable, effective from 21<sup>st</sup> May. This is significantly different to the old timetable, so please check your journey times on the Chiltern Railways website before travelling. Key Monday to Friday morning journeys to London Marylebone now depart at 07:12, 07:52, 08:12, 08:26, 08:50, 09:11.

#### Talk: "A One Place Study – Bletchingdon 1737-1947"

Friend of the Village News, Charles Eldridge, who has written articles for the magazine, will be giving a talk to the Oxfordshire Family History Society at Exeter Hall, Kidlington on Monday 24<sup>th</sup> July at 8pm (doors open 7:15pm). The subject is "A One Place Study – Bletchingdon 1737-1947". The talk will focus on changes to the village around 1800 and specific events in the village. To accompany the talk, Charles will also provide some background documents (maps, photographs and indexes) for viewing before and after the meeting.

Cost of entry to non-members is £2, payable at the door, and please mention you are a Bletchington resident. The talk will last approximately one hour and there will be a short Questions & Answers session to follow. Please come along and find out more about your village in times past.

#### FROM THE RECTOR

Dear friends,

I have just come back from casting my vote. I was amused to be congratulated for being the first voter. As I said to the Presiding Officer, it's pretty well the first time I've been first for anything! I was in a meeting the other evening and after the formal business closed the participants continued in conversation. By a slightly circuitous route we got onto politics. I was intrigued that one of those present spoke in such a way as to assume that I shared her political views (I don't!). We are fortunate to live in a country where we are permitted a range of political opinions and that has at least some claim to call itself democratic (though in my view an overhaul of the voting system is long overdue). Yet in recent times, and in supposedly democratic countries, we have seen examples of those who fear losing power trying to manipulate the electoral process. In other countries there is blatant, or only slightly concealed, dictatorship.

A worrying development is the potential for 'bad actors', as they have been called, to use Artificial Intelligence to undermine plebiscites and other electoral processes for their own malevolent ends. Easy access to the internet is also have a worrying effect on our schools. It is difficult for parents to control what their children watch on their screens, and equally difficult for teachers to monitor what is shared in the playground.

On the positive side, our three village schools put a huge amount of effort into reinforcing certain core values, some of them 'Christian' values, some of them 'British' ones, and of course there is a considerable element of overlap. Honesty, integrity, respect, resilience – these are just a few of the virtues espoused, taught and exemplified on a daily basis. We are very fortunate indeed to have such good local schools, and that these fundamental ingredients of a good life are so deeply embedded.

Sharing and developing these values does not, of course, mean that everyone will share the same political opinions, and I hope that we will continue to enjoy a diversity of outlook. Whatever the threats, as well as the opportunities, posed by the inexorable development of sophisticated technology, I have huge confidence that the younger generation will play a positive role in building a world that is more just and more equitable, challenging prejudice and distortion in all their manifestations. Those of us who are older can share our wisdom, but we should also be open to receive the wisdom of the young, who are generally are far less governed by unconscious biases.

# Coming our way?



Yes, a 15 metre telecommunication mast like the one on the left (in Kidlington by Miller & Carter's) could soon be on its way to Bletchington, destined for the location below.



A planning application has been submitted by a telecoms company to erect a 15 metre tall telecommunications installation right in the centre of Bletchington, adjacent to the bus shelter and facing the Village Green. Some residents are rightly concerned about this proposed structure.

More details about the planning application can be found on the Cherwell District Council website:

Type the reference number 23/01222/TEL56 into the appropriate field and click 'search'. Details of the application will appear in the resultant screen, then you should click on the reference number, then on the next screen you have the opportunity to comment on the application by clicking 'comment on this application'.

You will then be asked to enter your name, address and e-mail details, then under "Your comments", select 'type of comment' from the list, where you can select 'Comment', 'Support' or 'Objection'. Please note the deadline to lodge objections (or messages of support) is 9<sup>th</sup> June.

The site in question is a conservation area and the erection of a mast would blight the appearance of the Village Green and surrounding area for many years to come. Whilst mobile phone signals are not always great in Bletchington, there must surely be a more appropriate site to erect such a mast.

It is understood the Parish Council will be objecting to this planning application but, if you are unhappy with the plan, the more objections that are received by Cherwell District Council, the more likely it is to be turned down.

It is also understood that a similar application to erect a telecoms mast in Kirtlington was turned down, so this proposal is certainly not a done deal.

We have two defibrillators available in the village, located at the Village Hall, on the side nearest to the Co-op and at the Sports & Social Club. To access these devices, you will need to call 999 to obtain a code whilst also requesting an ambulance. Instructions on how to use the defibrillators and how to keep the patient safe are posted close by. Your prompt action before the ambulance arrives may save a life.

#### Bring your partner, kids, parents...

You may recall a piece I wrote for the Dec.22/Jan.23 edition of our Village News entitled 'Could Bletchington Help Save Kirtlington Morris Men?' Sadly we have not been inundated with Bletchingtonian gents leaping to the rescue of their old rival.

There was one spark of interest though, but interestingly from a couple of ladies of this parish, who said that if only we would admit women, they might well be interested. So, after much thought and discussion we announced to Kirtlington in April:

#### THE GOOD NEWS IS - KIRTLINGTON MORRIS IS NOW OPEN TO ALL!

Still no response from Kirtlington, so now, women of Bletchington, it's your turn...

Many men's morris sides have become 'mixed', or to use the approved term, all-inclusive, in recent years, in order to preserve their tradition. The great morris revival of the 1970s and 80s is in the distant past and we are all that much older, with few if any younger recruits. What was once largely (but not exclusively) the preserve of male dancers is now opening up to all genders, and we have decided to follow that trend, in the name of equality and in the hope of preserving of our own tradition. We have had one or two women dance with us unofficially in the past but now it's official!

This is also an opportunity for couples to join us. Rather than coming on your own, not knowing anyone (although we are very friendly and not at all scary), come with your partner and encourage each other! Or better still, come with a group of friends... And, whisper it, it's a subtle, fun and rewarding way of keeping fit. We're social too; it wouldn't be practice night without a pint afterwards.

I'd be very happy to answer any questions you may have. Practices are Tuesdays, 8 to 9:30pm at Kirtlington Village Hall. Unfortunately the practice season is now nearly over for this spring and if we had sufficient numbers we would now be 'dancing out' at nearby pubs that we can find open on a Tuesday evening, which in itself is becoming increasingly difficult. But please do ring or email to register your interest, because if enough people are keen we will be very happy to organise a couple of special introductory practices prior to beginning to practise regularly again in the autumn.

MEANWHILE......Morris dancing turned up unexpectedly earlier this year at the Brit Music Awards. If you watched (or saw the clip on the national news!) you will have seen Wet Leg performing Chaise Longue, their earworm hit of 2022, accompanied throughout by the dancing of women's side Boss Morris, from Stroud, Gloucestershire. It's unusual to say the least to see morris on the telly unless it's mentioned for comedic effect, so perhaps a few younger people might have seen it and want to know more. Google it! They have quite a slow style of dancing, not unlike Kirtlington's...

#### **Bird Nesting Season**

#### **Thoughts from Green Bletch**

As we finally have our first warm days of spring and we fling our doors and windows open, we realise how lucky we are to live so close to nature and the abundance of wild birds on our doorstep.

The birds are more active than ever right now, feeding their young constantly throughout the day, making them vulnerable to predators.

Providing a bird feeder in the garden really helps the birds throughout the year but it also allows them to become vulnerable from our pet cats. If you do own a cat, please, at the very least, put a bell on its collar.

#### Advice from the RSPB for people who feed birds in their garden is:

- Surround an area with a fence (chicken wire etc) that leans in the direction from which the cat will approach. Cats will find it difficult to climb over an angled fence.
- Place half-full plastic bottles in borders, or string old CDs across flower beds or hang from trees the light reflection is supposed to deter.
- Feeders should be placed about 2m from dense vegetation, preventing surprise attacks from cats but giving birds easy access to cover.
- Fit tree collars to help prevent cats climbing up trees.
- A downward-opening cone or a biscuit tin fixed to the pole below the bird table should prevent cats climbing up it.
- Placing clippings from thorny or spiky plants under bird feeders and under bushes will help prevent cats from using these areas to stalk birds.
- The garden plant, Coleus canina or Solenostemon canina, is marketed under the names Pee-off and Scaredy-cat. This plant has a pungent odour that is said to repel cats and other mammals from the garden.
- Scent deterrents will either serve to repel (eg. Citronella) or mark a territory (eg. Silent Roar). Alternatively, try orange or lemon peel, since cats are not keen on the smell of citrus.

#### Advice from the RSPB for cat owners is:

- Put a bell on your cat's collar. Recent studies suggest that colourful collars may also reduce predation of birds, and may reduce predation of mice and voles, too. The collar must be correctly fitted and should have a quick release mechanism to allow the cat to free itself, should it become snagged. There are commerciallyavailable sonic collars which are designed to alert the potential prey to the cat's presence.
- Keep your cat indoors when birds are most vulnerable: at least an hour before sunset and an hour after sunrise, especially during March-July, and also after bad weather, to allow birds to come out and feed.

#### **William Morris and Morris Motors**

Born in Worcester in 1877, William Richard Morris moved to Oxford at the age of three. A keen competitive cyclist, by the age of 15 he had established a bicycle repair business in an outbuilding at his parents' home in Cowley, soon expanding into manufacturing bicycles, as well as repairing them. Further expansion took the business into motorcycles and by 1901, new premises in Oxford High Street were acquired, followed by a workshop and storage space in Queen's Lane. Morris then embarked upon a couple of unsuccessful business ventures involving partnerships, both of which were quickly dissolved.

In 1904, Morris was operating as a sole trader once again and the following year diversified into operating taxis, then in 1910 and now trading as WRM Motors Ltd, the business began selling new cars. Working from premises in Longwall Street, leased from Merton College, in 1912, Morris designed and built the porotype of his first car, the famous Bullnose Morris or, to give it its official name, the Morris Oxford. The following year, the company moved to the Cowley site, previously the grounds of a military college, enabling the new car to enter full production, retailing at £165. By 1925, the company was producing over 1,000 cars a week and by 1937, Morris was the largest car manufacturer in Europe. A year later the millionth vehicle was produced. As demand for new cars fell during World War I, Morris landed lucrative contracts to produce military equipment.

William Morris was elevated to the peerage in 1934 as Baron Nuffield then in 1938 he became Viscount Nuffield, a reward not just for his contribution to motor manufacturing but also his philanthropy. He founded Nuffield College in 1937 and the Nuffield Foundation in 1943 and for the rest of his life, continued to make generous charitable donations, particularly to hospitals and medical causes.

After the war, WRM Motors Ltd was liquidated and Morris Motors Ltd was formed in its place. The most iconic vehicles of the post-war era were the Morris Minor, launched in 1948 and the first British car to achieve sales of one million, and the Mini, launched in 1959. Both designed by Alec Issigonis, the latter was produced jointly with Austin, the two companies having effectively merged in 1952 to form the British Motor Corporation (BMC). Morris died in 1963 and in 1968 the company merged with Leyland Motors to form British Leyland, which was part-nationalised in 1975. The car plant in Cowley has, no doubt, employed many Bletchington residents over the years. Now under the control of BMW, it is currently used in the production of the new generation of Minis.

The Morris Motors Museum shares a site with the Oxford Bus Museum in Long Hanborough and is well worth a visit. It is open Wednesdays and Sundays plus Saturdays during July and August.

#### **Bletchington Thursday Club**

We held our AGM at our May meeting. We did not have any members willing to take on the roles of Chairman and Secretary so these remained the same. We did, however, have two people willing to come on to the committee.

After the AGM we held a coronation party with music provided by Tommy.

We have entertainment from a saxophonist for our June meeting followed by a party for our oldest member.

#### Did you know.....?

Our village name has two different spellings and whilst this is unusual, it is by no means unique.

An example of another village with two spellings is Tithby in Nottinghamshire, also spelt Tythby. Meanwhile in Derbyshire, the village of Youlgreave has three spellings, also being known as Youlgrave and Youlegreave.

But spare a thought for the good folk of Trellech in Monmouthshire, South Wales, whose village has no fewer than **twenty-six** different recorded spellings of its name, encompassing Welsh and English versions. Four of these spellings are still in common use and appear on road signs.

#### Oxfordshire Electric Vehicle car club pilot launches

An Oxfordshire-wide pilot of electric vehicle (EV) car clubs has begun, with fourteen new car club EVs being launched across Abingdon, Banbury, Bicester, Eynsham, Henley, Kidlington, Oxford, Thame, Witney, Wallingford and Wantage. These shared vehicles — operated by CoWheels, Enterprise CarClub and Thame EV Hire Club - will be available for people to use on a pay-per-use basis that provides a convenient and affordable alternative to individual car ownership, as well as providing an opportunity for petrol and diesel drivers to try an EV without any long-term commitment.



Oxfordshire County Council has coordinated the pilot and facilitated the arrangements between participating councils, car club operators and chargepoint operators. The EV car club vehicles will mainly be based at Park & Charge hubs in District Council car parks, and Oxford City Council are also introducing a new EV car club based at the Energy SuperHub at Redbridge Park & Ride.

Whilst car clubs have seen great success within Oxford, little has been tested outside of the City. The aim of this pilot project is to demonstrate the demand for car clubs in more urban and rural areas and test the business models for non-city EV car clubs. The hope is that if successful this pilot will help inform future EV car club roll-out strategy for the County and pave the way for more EV car clubs across Oxfordshire in the future.

The new pilot car club vehicles offer you the convenience of a car, with minimal cost, hassle and zero tailpipe emissions. Give them a try and join one of the new EV car clubs - www.oxfordshire.gov.uk/EVcarclubs.

#### **BLETCHINGDON IN 1921**

The 1921 census was held on Sunday 19<sup>th</sup> June 1921. It had been delayed by 8 weeks because of industrial unrest. This is a look at Bletchingdon on that day.

Just three years on from the end of World War I and in the wake of the Spanish flu pandemic, the 1921 Census took a snapshot of life in England and Wales and found a population forever changed. One change of course was that since 1918 all men over the age of 21 and women over the age of thirty could vote. The seeds of change were evident in the village at the time and a portent of what was going to happen in the next decades.

For the first and only time, information was gathered on orphanhood status, offering insight into the possible effects of war and pandemic. There were five families in Bletchingdon where words "father dead" were recorded but of these at least one was through natural causes and only one was recorded as killed in action. Nine children were affected. The 1921 Census was also the first to recognise divorce as a marital condition but this was not something that featured in Bletchingdon not least because for most people divorce was unthinkable on social and financial grounds.

The population of the village was given as 492. However, ten of these were visitors and there was also an itinerant couple in a caravan on the village green. (He gave his occupation as Evangelist!). Taking this couple and the visitors into account the "true" population would have been 480, a reduction of six from the 1911 census. Of the 480, 250 were men and 230 women (48%) the opposite of the figure for the population as a whole where 52% were women. Males outnumber females in every age group except the 41 to 50. The oldest person was Thomas Green whose age was recorded as 1 month shy of his 90<sup>th</sup> birthday. (There is however some ambiguity about this). There were two men and two women in their eighties. The table below shows a comparison with the most recently available figures:

The number of dwellings had grown from 120 in 1911 to 125 in 1921, though it is not clear in either year how many were unoccupied. Today there are over 400 dwellings. The number of rooms was recorded, with 91 of the 125 properties having 5 or fewer rooms (this did not include bathrooms but did include kitchens). A total of 342 people (71%) lived in these properties with an average of 1 room per person. This meant that in many of the 91 properties there were more people than rooms. To give three examples:

- Henry Cherry of Oxford Road lived with his wife and five children in a 3 roomed house.
- William Kenny of The Green shared his 3 roomed house with 4 other adults and a 12 year old.
- Thomas Green lived in Station Road and shared his 5 roomed house with 4 other adults and 5 children aged 15 and younger.

Work had changed since 1911. Of the 216 people recording their occupation in 1921, 167 were men and 49 were women. This number had fallen from 243 in 1911. 68, including those described as farmers had agricultural occupations. This is 31.5% of the working population, down from 40.3% ten years earlier. 15 people described themselves as farmers. Of course, Bletchingdon Park was a big employer. There were 10 live-in staff (down from 14 ten years earlier) and a further 14 people in the village who gave Lord Valentia as their employer.

One of the innovations of the 1921 census was to ask for the employer or, if out of work the previous employer. There were twenty-five men and two women described as out of work. Eight of the men gave a farmer as their previous employer. Sixteen men had been employed by the Oxford Portland cement company who ran the Kirtlington quarry. There were therefore 12.5% of the working population of the village out of work. Ten of the men were the head of the family, mostly with dependent children. I don't know what caused the cement company to make so many men redundant but can only conclude that it was a result of competition and the decline of housebuilding after the post war boom. Agriculture was also heading for difficult time as the government abandoned the war time price and wage controls and let the markets take over.

There were however some new jobs. Arthur Smith had set up an agricultural engineer business at Enslow and employed four men from the village. Although an old institution, the Thames Conservancy now employed four men from the village. Two men were also employed as chauffeurs, one of them who was the chauffeur to Miss Annesley was only 17. Another man described himself as a motor driver. Mostly interestingly perhaps there were three girls who were apprentices in Oxford. Two were apprenticed dressmakers to Webbers in the High Street and the third a shorthand typist to Hunts in Broad Street. A fourth person, a man worked as a gardener in Oxford. Did they lodge in the City (the census was on a Sunday), catch the train every day or was there some other form of transport?

It is difficult to appreciate from a census what life must have been like a hundred years ago. Many houses may well not have had electricity, running water or mains drainage. Many things have gone; the blacksmith, the station and the chapel for example. The population density in the village itself would have been much higher than today. A number of the older cottages have been knocked together to make one house. Quincotts in Islip Road is an example, it was once five cottages.

A lot of memoirs of the time have the phrase "we was poor but we was happy". This phrase is usually about childhood however and no doubt children in Bletchingdon were happy. They could roam around unsupervised and there was very little traffic to worry about. By today's standards they, and their families, were definitely poor. Rural Oxfordshire was a very poor area. Agricultural depression had set in in 1875 and would continue that way until after WW2. Whether the adults "was happy" is another matter, the unemployment of 1921 was a foretaste of things to come over the next decade or so. Agriculture declined further and what there was became more mechanised and so jobs would also have declined. The houses may also have been tied to farm jobs. People would have had to leave in order to find work. This was no new feature however. Even in the 19<sup>th</sup> century many, particularly women and girls, left the village to work or marry. In fact, the population of the village had declined by 30% in the fifty years from 1871 and by 1931 it was down by over a third. Fortunately, by 1921 the car industry in Oxford had taken off and many people moved into the City from the countryside. How many of the 135 under 16s in 1921 remained to live in the village is an interesting question.

The population also declined from the 480 in 1921 to 459 ten years later and only 478 in 1951. (There is no knowing either how many visitors there were in these two years). By 1961 it was above the 1921 level and only in 1971 had it recovered to much the same figure as 1871. Life in 1971 had changed immeasurably in the previous fifty years and even more so by today's standards.

It is easy to get nostalgic about the past, but I doubt if many of us would want to go back a hundred years where the things we take for granted, running water, electricity, mains drainage and so on were virtually unheard of. It was of course safer and much, much quieter!

We won't be able to watch anything at the Playhouse now without wondering what is happening backstage and if the safety pins are handy.

Our social meeting on the 21st June is to be a meal at the Chequers and on the 19th July Sheila Churchill's talk is entitled TB or not to be.

We would like to invite all ladies to join us (several are already from Bletchington and other villages). #### <u>Kirtlington & Bletchington Historical Society</u>

What do the following have in common? A Roman roof tile, a Victorian Thames Waterman's badge of office, a German citizen's identity papers from 1922, the original deed of building the Kirtlington Methodist chapel in 1852 and an eagle taken from a French standard at the Battle of Waterloo? They were all brought by members of the Historical Society to its AGM in April.

Each member spoke for a few minutes about their artefact, some of which had family connections. The Roman roof tile had been taken (with permission) from the site of the villa at North Leigh (one of a number close to Akeman Street). The Victorian Waterman's badge belonged to the great-grandfather of one of our members. As part of his official duties he occasionally had to row Queen Victoria and her daughters on the lakes in the royal parks. The German identity papers were the result of a decision taken by the grandmother of another of our members. She was living in the free port of Danzig after World War One (whose inhabitants were technically stateless and were given two years to opt to become German citizens). As a result, her grandson has been able to claim dual German-British nationality (thereby remaining in the EU). The present residents of the Methodist chapel are custodians of the deed which bought the land on which their house stands. They also have the mortgage deed which raised the money for the purchase. The eagle was taken by a forebear of another member. Only a lad of 17 in the British army against Napoleon in 1815, he left a vivid description of the battle and his part in it in two letters written shortly afterwards to his mother. And then they say that history is boring.

#### From your Cherwell District councillors - Launton & Otmoor District

Summer is certainly on its way and it is so nice to have some warmer weather after the past couple of weeks. As many of you may be aware Angus decided to step down from being one of your District Councillors but we are delighted that Julian Nedelcu was elected to be District Councillor for Launton and Otmoor in his place. Julian looks forward to meeting as many of you as possible soon.

#### **Cherwell Elections**

Elections for Cherwell District Council took place on Thursday 4<sup>th</sup> May which resulted in no party having overall control of the council. The final councillor numbers are: Conservative 20, Labour 12, Liberal Democrats 10, The Green Party 3, Independents 3. Talks took place between Progressive Oxfordshire (made up of the Liberal Democrats, Greens and one Independent) and the Labour Party to try and form a progressive administration and an agreement was almost ready. However unfortunately the Labour Party pulled out of talks last minute. We are saddened by this development as many residents made it clear to us that they wished for change at Cherwell. At the Annual Council meeting on the 17<sup>th</sup> May, the Conservative Leader of the Council was removed as leader to reflect this want for change. At the time of writing, we hope that talks can resume between Progressive Oxfordshire and the Labour Party to deliver a strong majority administration for Cherwell.

Bletchington Sports & Social Club is situated at the end of the drive in the playing field on Oxford Road. The Sports field used to be located in the grounds of Bletchington Park. It moved to the current location which was owned by Lord Valentia and was rented to the village to use for football and cricket. In the 1960s Lord Rotherwick generously donated the land to the village. The original clubhouse was described as "a very basic structure". The first bar was opened on 19<sup>th</sup> March 1978 by Mr Arthur Eeley. The go-ahead to build the current clubhouse was given by the committee in 1980 at a cost of £50,000 and was extended around ten years ago adding the veranda and scorebox.

The club is self-funded and run entirely by volunteers from the village. We offer memberships throughout the year that are renewed on 1<sup>st</sup> September. Memberships cost just £15 for a family, £10 for an individual and £5 for senior citizens and U18's. You are more than welcome to come in for a drink.

We currently have 4 youth football teams (U16, U13, U10 & U9), 3 Cricket Teams, 2 Bar Billiards Teams, 3 Darts Teams, a Quiz Team, Aunt Sally, and a Cribbage Team who all base themselves at the Club. We also have a very active social committee who regularly host Bingo, Live Music and other events that are generally free admission and open to everyone. We have Sky Sports, Darts, Pool and a Billiards Table. We generally open for any major televised sporting events.

Our opening hours vary during the week, but we are always open from 5:00pm on Friday and 7:30 on Saturday evenings. More details can be found on our Facebook page. Please join our Facebook page for details of opening hours and events.

We are able to offer use of the clubhouse outside of normal hours for Private Events such as Christenings and Funeral Wakes. If you would like to make use of the facilities drop into the club or make contact with a member of the committee to check availability. We can also accommodate parties during normal opening times, but members will still be permitted to use the bar.

#### **Polite Notice**

There is a public footpath that runs from Oxford Road through the sports field. If you use this, we would be grateful if you could keep dogs on leads and clean up behind them. This helps us keep the area safe for the children and sports teams that use the facilities.

We have also experienced some damage to the clubhouse where ball games have been played against the building. These are costly repairs, and we respectfully ask that this is avoided.

# Women and War: From the Fringes to the Front Line New exhibition to tell the stories of women in the armed forces

Women & War: From the Fringes to the Front Line is a new exhibition opening on 3<sup>rd</sup> June to 10<sup>th</sup> September 2023 at Soldiers of Oxfordshire Museum in Woodstock. Women & War will explore the diverse experiences of women who have been involved with all aspects of military life, from the 'fringes' of history to those now taking on front line roles in the armed forces today. Using unique, personal stories, pen portraits of women in historical and modern roles feature throughout.

Museum Director, Ursula Corcoran, explains: "This new exhibition is a wonderful opportunity to mark and commemorate those women who have lived through and served in conflict. The objects and stories on display give a voice to women who are often not centre stage when we think of war. There are stories not only of suffering and loss, but also of duty, innovation, friendship and love. We are extremely grateful to all of the organisations and individual women who have contributed so generously to the exhibition."

From 1941, women were called up for war work, in roles such as mechanics, engineers, munitions workers, air raid wardens, bus and fire engine drivers. Away from these vital roles more than 80,000 women joined the Women's Land Army, 'Land Girls' enduring tough conditions and long hours in isolated rural outposts in order to prevent Britain from being 'starved out'. Others would join women's auxiliary units of the Armed Forces, such as the Women's Auxiliary Air Force, Women's Royal Naval Service and Auxiliary Territorial Service.

A number of objects, on loan from individuals and organisations that have also shared their stories for the exhibition, will go on show at the Soldiers of Oxfordshire Museum for the first time. These include an Air Transport Auxiliary jacket which belonged to Mary Watkins of Leafield, Oxfordshire who took her flying lessons in Witney. She was the youngest pilot in the county when she began in 1937. Her story will be told with thanks to Maidenhead Heritage Centre and ATA Museum. A series of letters and a pair of officer's gloves belonging to Rev. Elsie Chamberlain, on loan from the Royal Army Chaplains' Museum help illustrate the story of the first female Chaplain in the RAF, whose appointment sparked protest from both the RAF and the Church of England in 1946. Her name was originally excluded from RAF lists and her service concealed.

In the Special Operations Executive (SOE) Churchill recruited around 60 women who were deployed behind enemy lines, usually by parachute or fishing boats, to help form a 'secret army' of resistance fighters preparing the way for the Allied invasion. Objects used during the war by women recruited by SOE will also once again go on display at the museum, including a radio receiver concealed inside a biscuit tin. Women continued to play a vital role after the war and over the last two decades, women have taken on more jobs in the British Army. Since 2018, all Army roles have been open to them. This includes combat roles in the infantry and special forces units. But even before that, many female soldiers had been serving on the front line and in war zones across the world. Away from the front line, women have taken on positions and broken down the barriers in what were once male-dominated roles in MI5 and MI6; the UK's Security Service and Secret Service.

Members of the First Aid Nursing Yeomanry (FANY), founded in 1907, most famously played significant roles in the SOE during the Second World War, but remain active today. Members of the FANY have seen service in Iraq and Afghanistan, as well as providing vital support during disasters, terrorist attacks and crises at home in the UK. 'We turn up to help, whenever needed.' Says Jessica Lakin, who joined the FANY in 2002. She describes the most impactful experience of her service as a recent as 'three months in 2017 when I mobilized for four disasters. The crescendo-ing emotional effect of assisting after the Westminster Bridge attack, Borough Market attack, Manchester Arena bomb and then the Grenfell fire, was impactful.'

#### <u>Bletchingdon Parish Council</u> <u>Annual Meeting of the Parish</u>

The Notice of Meeting was read.

Apologies for absence: County Cllr N Simpson, District Cllrs G. Coton and S. Holland

**Confirmation of Minutes:** The Minutes of the Annual Meeting of the Parish held on Wednesday 25<sup>th</sup> May 2022 were published in the Village News following the meeting and made available for all to read prior to the start of the meeting. All electors present confirmed they were in agreement with the minutes. The Chairman confirmed this and they were signed in the presence of the Clerk.

#### **Chairman's Report**

#### Queen Elizabeth II

Queen Elizabeth celebrated with the country in June her Platinum Anniversary, an excellent achievement of record reign and total dedication serving her nation.

Later in the year the death of the Queen was announced, a solemn moment in September. Our village and the nation came together in public grief in recognition of the extraordinary dedication Queen Elizabeth II gave. A book of condolences was displayed in the church for many to sign. The parish council wrote to the King on behalf of the village to offer our condolences.

#### **Traffic Calming**

Traffic calming through our village is a major topic and concern. For more than 2 years the Parish Council has asked Cherwell for a breakdown of figures for full width speed humps and despite follow up communication and help from the District and County Council we have had no definitive reply. We have complained about the crossing and beacon malfunction and fading hatched white lines for over two years. The Parish Council has raised these concerns highlighting the safety concerns to Dave Catlin at Highways many times, Nigel Simpson at OCC, Bill Cotton Corporate Director for Environment, Andrew Gant the Cabinet Minister for Highway Management, the Chief Executive, John Howell MP and Nick Mould from the Duchy.

Provisional figures to carry out the full length speed humps was £27,760. To create a further 3 parking spaces near the loading bays on Station Road by the Co-op is £21,942. Parking around the Co-op is also a concern to safety. Villagers are now benefitting from a very successful Co-op, unfortunately with inadequate parking made at the planning stage. The inadequate parking spaces is not helped by residents parking their vehicles in the allocated Co-op parking places instead of their own allocated spots.

We have obtained speed detector guns to monitor speeds in the hope that this will reduce speed through the village. Councillor Matt Whitehead is trained to use this equipment but would really appreciate others to assist him on behalf of the Parish.

The good news is, as you see, along with many villages we now have a 20mph speed limit through the village, the cost being met by the County Council. We are currently trying to obtain prices for vehicle activated signs which show drivers their speed, in the hope that this will help to reduce their speed.

The Parish Council have erected posts opposite the Co-op to prevent drivers going onto the grass and making a mess of the entrance to the village.

#### **Bottle Banks**

Little to report on the bottle banks. To recap, they are not allowed to be close to the gas chamber and not weight bearing over the gas pipeline. This movement is with Cherwell District Council's legal team and has been for 18 months, to move it further back between the field and the allotment wall.

#### **Duchy Field Development**

This is getting close to being finished, many years after it should have been. One house now remains unfinished with a hopeful date of completion in the Autumn. The original footpath through Duchy Fields is now open at last and thus closing the temporary one. The new play area was also completed and opened and is very popular with the local children.

#### **Rural Bus Service**

This has been a trying and complicated concern for our village and keeping the 250 bus in service was important to many. It has been running commercially unviable for some time. Our public transport representative Anne Maclachlan has been an exceptional help in assisting the Parish Council. A new bus company with a new service timetable was recently agreed with Oxfordshire County Council (OCC) so for the time being we still have our bus. The current contract will continue until 29<sup>th</sup> March 2025 and the £2 fare arrangement will continue until at least 30<sup>th</sup> June 2023.

#### **Elections**

Last year the Parish Council elections were uncontested with 6 members re-elected, leaving a vacancy on the Parish Council. The position was advertised to co-opt and we subsequently interviewed. Following this, I am pleased to welcome Nicola Morris to the team. At this year's May 2023 elections for a District Councillor, we welcome Julian Nedelau. Angus Patrick decided for personal reasons not to put his name forward for election. We wish him well and thank him for his services this past year. Our current other two District Councillors are Simon Holland and Gemma Coton. Gemma has been a regular attendee at our meetings and been excellent. Nigel Simpson is our County Councillor and likewise a regular attendee and has too been excellent.

#### **Precept**

The Parish Council handles the precept claimed from Cherwell District Council (CDC), this money received covers many items. To name just a few, the play area maintenance, tree surveys and subsequent maintenance, mowing The Green, insurances, dog bins, sign posts, posts on the green, grants to the Church grounds maintenance, Village News and various charities which benefit residents of our village. This year will be the second year when the Parish Council have not increased the precept request making a 0% increase.

#### **Neighbourhood Plan**

The Parish Council are progressing a neighbourhood plan application. Many will remember a meeting to inform the village was held some months back, it was well attended and gave parishioners an insight into what it is hoped to achieve. We have been able to secure a grant from Cherwell to assist with these costs.

#### **Planning**

There have been a number of planning issues which are always published in the Village News. There are a few refusals and appeals currently ongoing. The main one being the cement operation plant at Enslow.

#### **Alms Houses**

Residents from the Alms houses from The Row have now been rehoused to Deddington. Green Square Accord flexed their muscles and gave residents notice to leave with no chance of remaining in the village; some had been here for up to 40 years. It was claimed to be not viable to continue maintaining these old properties and so will be sold on the open market. The Parish Council gave full support to reject Green Square Accord's decision but was unsuccessful.

#### **Adult Gym**

The Parish Council are trying to get permission to install equipment for an adult gym at Springwell Close on the children's play area. That area does not seem popular, given the new play area on the Duchy development.

#### **Litter Pick**

We are grateful to all those helping again this year - it proves to be a successful operation. As most of the litter appears to be on the road side entrance to the village, it gives concern to the safety of those volunteers at future events.

#### Pub

Sadly our pub closed again in January due to high running costs. The owner has always stated that renovation work will happen but not at the present time, due to other development commitments.

#### The Slipe

Unfortunately nothing has changed since last year, despite the PC urging the Bletchington Community Foundation (BCF) to manage this area. It has continued to become overgrown as time goes on. To recap, the word 'Slipe' is an ancient piece of ground that drovers used to rest cattle overnight when moving to other farms or to market. There was no other transport other than walking in those days.

An extract from the BCF annual report says "The BCF has purchased an area of land known as The Slipe on Islip Road, adjacent to Diamond Farm, during 2019. This is an area of historical significance and a grant has been obtained from HUMBY-TECK to cover the purchase of the land and future maintenance and improvements, the land will be retained as grazing land initially pending a community meeting to discuss options for the site." The Parish Council notes that in the BCF 2021 accounts a sum of £37,445 was ring fenced for maintenance and running costs associated with the Slipe. I do hope we get some progress in the near future, as the BCF management of The Slipe is disappointing to say the least. The Parish Council has offered help to meet to discuss further with any assistance they can offer and with their full support.

#### Tree

We have a new tree that has been donated by CDC in Valencia Close. We are looking for someone to adopt it through the summer with a weekly bucket of water. Please see one of us if you can help.

#### **HGVs** through the village

The Parish Council continue to pursue this restriction through our village with the help of our County Councillor. Recently the Government has passed a motion to legalise an increase in the length of articulated lorries by a further 2 metres, up to 18.5 meters!

#### **King's Coronation**

The recent event at the Village Hall to celebrate Kings Charles III's Coronation was an occasion to be remembered. It was a pleasure to see so many people together enjoying this special day. It was a great success and a huge thank you to all those that arranged and helped to make this such an occasion to be remembered. Grace Tharby and Sue Davis were instrumental in making this event a success and quickly secured a large team of volunteer's. I apologise for not mentioning all of those who helped as there were many, but it did not go unnoticed so thank you to all of you.

#### Other Items of interest close to the Village

It has just been announced by OCC that £3m has been allocated for pot hole repairs.

We have supported our neighbouring Parish in raising concerns for the developing of the Botley Solar Farm. If agreed, it is believed to be the third largest in Europe.

The Rail freight interchange at Ardley is still in consultation stages.

The Oxford United Football Ground discussions are ongoing with a decision due in the Autumn, for the football ground on the triangle area near Stratfield Brake in Kidlington.

#### **Thanks**

Thanks to those who have assisted the Parish Council throughout the year. Their help, and there's many, has been greatly appreciated. Thank you. Many thanks also to my fellow councillors for the support I have received throughout the year. They have worked selflessly each and every one of them, they each have their own special skills which shares out the Parish Council workload. They really are an excellent team to work with.

My final thanks as always, is to Fiona. Fiona has developed into a perfect Clerk to the Parish Council. She is extremely efficient and continues to be in total control of her duty. She has been an excellent assistant to me as Chairman and I'd describe her as a perfectionist.

As this is my last year as Chairman, the next Chairperson will be so lucky to have her working alongside.

#### <u>Cherwell District Council and Oxfordshire County Council Reports</u>

G. Coton from CDC and N. Simpson from OCC shared their reports via email prior to the meeting. The clerk read these reports to everyone present. If you would like to see a copy of these, please contact the clerk.

#### **Parish Council Finance Report**

During the financial year Bletchingdon Parish Council received £34,314.55. £24,500.00 of this was from the Precept, which is the money given to a Parish Council by the District Council (Cherwell) to carry out it's duties. Bletchingdon Parish Council made payments totalling £34,274.84 from April 2022 – March 2023. We had a carry forward balance in April 2022 of £58,642.86, leaving a balance in hand at 31st March 2023 of £58,682.57. As reported before, this is a large figure to have as a carry forward however the Parish Council have set aside a large proportion of this for traffic calming measures, road safety and the Neighbourhood and Parish Plan. The PC are still waiting for confirmation of costs with regards to traffic calming measures such as full width speed humps and other road safety measures, so we still don't know if we have enough for the project. The new 20mph speed limit is now in place, and with thanks to the Parish Council taking the opportunity to get this in place during Oxfordshire County Council's scheme, this did not cost our Parish anything.

As part of the Parish Plan, a Neighbourhood Plan has been started. Some of the funds from our carried forward figures have been allocated but our Councillors have also managed to secure grants to supplement the costs incurred so far. A donation was made towards the Blacks Head pub to celebrate the Coronation last summer, which was a community event arranged by the landlords of the pub, for our village and was a great success.

Further grants were awarded to the Parish Council which were used to provide a new storage unit at the Recreation Ground which is a space for the community to store community items such as marquees or sports equipment. There were also a number of repairs to the playground recommended following the annual inspection of the Recreation Ground which the Parish Council have taken care of as well as critical tree work on both The Green and the Recreation Ground.

In January 2023, our Parish Councillors agreed to request the Precept be set at £24,500 as it was the year before but with the increase of residents at the Duchy development this will not increase the Council Tax rate. This has been agreed by Cherwell District Council (CDC). The Parish Council has a budget drawn up to ensure these funds are enough to carry out all the day-to-day duties to ensure the parish remains in good order.

For Bletchingdon PC the largest expenditure, except the Clerk's salary, is on grounds maintenance where we pay a contractor to undertake the grass cutting of the Village Green, verges on Weston Road and in Annesley Close as well as weeding throughout the village. We also have the trees to look after on the Village Green and at the Recreation Ground. We pay CDC to empty the dog bins and we own and are responsible for the play area at the Recreation Ground (but not the one at Springwell Close). We give donations to the Church towards grass cutting, to the Village News and to requests received that are to the benefit of our parishioners. Providing information to departments within Oxfordshire CC and various service departments within Cherwell District Council is a key role of the Parish Council along with making the Parish a nice place for you to live and work. As Parishioners, you are entitled to see how this money is spent and to suggest ways in which the Parish Council could improve the Parish, by attending meetings or talking to the Clerk, or any of the Councillors.

The full accounts can be viewed after they have been audited, either in person or on the website. A notice will be displayed on the Parish Council Notice Board shortly. If anyone is interested in knowing more detail, the monthly expenditure is included in the minutes of each meeting and these can be viewed on the village website or at the Parish Council Office in the Village Hall. The Clerk is the only paid member of the Parish Council. The Councillors are all volunteers.

#### **Matters from the Floor**

- A member of the BCF addressed the PC concerns with regards to progress with The Slipe. They confirmed they have been trying to establish contact with Frognest Farm for over a year as they are not very forthcoming. Preferable the BCF are working towards establishing a good relationship with the neighbour of The Slipe so that discussions about access are amicable. They believe that they are close to coming to the PC with plans explaining the next steps and thank the PC for their support.
- A concerned parishioner reported that there have been 3 burglaries on Weston Road in the last two
  weeks. Sadly the police say they cannot do anything without knowing the number plate of the vehicle
  used. The advice from the police is to 'be vigilant'. The PC confirmed a warning to residents will be put
  in the next Village News.

- A question was asked about whether or not a 5G Aerial proposal had been received in Bletchingdon.
  At the time of the meeting, the only thing the PC had received was a pre-consultation letter to which
  the PC replied opposing the idea. Should a planning application be received, the PC will strongly object
  to any plans.
- With regards to the 20mph speed limit, it was suggested that the repeater signs could be better positioned throughout the village. There are a number of them in places where it is hard to exceed the limit and other places where there are not nearly enough. The clerk will report this feedback to OCC Highways. A question was also raised about the Vehicle Activated Signs and where these might go. Cllr C. Lane reported that they are likely to be placed near the Co-op as you enter the village from Enslow and at the junction near the pub. Before that can be explored in more detail, the PC are working with Highways to get accurate costings.
- A question was asked about the affordable housing recently lost to the village and what can be done to replace them. At this time, the PC cannot influence this situation.
- With regards to the broken bridge at Enslow, does the PC know why this hasn't been repaired yet? The PC agreed to add this to the next PC agenda to enquire with OCC Highways.
- Does the PC know what is happening with The Rock of Gibralter pub? Unfortunately not.
- Lastly, T. Saunders wanted to add a special thanks to Cllr C. Lane who has worked as Chairman for nearly the last 2 and a half years. He said that he has done an enormous amount for the village and he is very grateful for all of his work.

Cllr C. Lane thanked everyone for their attendance tonight and closed the meeting at 20:30.


