

#### Village News advertising

The cost of advertising in Bletchington Village News has not increased since 2000. What else costs the same now as it did at the turn of the century? But with printing costs soaring, particularly during the last year, we are no longer able to sustain those prices. In order to continue producing your community magazine, free to readers, reluctantly we have decided, with effect from 2024, to increase our advertising rates by around 33%. We believe the new rates still represent excellent value for advertisers. Since 2000:

- Circulation has increased by at least 60 copies per edition, following the completion of the new Duchy
   Field development plus other newly built properties
- Average number of pages per edition has increased
- Overall quality of the magazine has been enhanced with the addition of a full colour cover

We do hope the new rates will not deter existing advertisers from renewing annual subscriptions and, if you run a local business and do not currently advertise with us, please consider doing so. As a free magazine for readers, we are reliant upon the support of local businesses, through advertising. If you take out an annual subscription in time for our next edition, December/January, you will be charged at the old rates.

#### **Sports & Social Club subscriptions**

Don't forget subscriptions for membership of the Sports & Social Club became due on 1<sup>st</sup> September. If you are a member, please remember to renew and, if you are not, why not consider joining? With no pub currently open in the village, the Club is the sole opportunity for residents to meet up for a convivial drink. Volunteer run, drink prices at the bar are generally cheaper than in local pubs, and members can enjoy various social events such as live music and bingo. Everyone is most welcome here.

The Wednesday morning Café at the Village Hall has resumed once again, following its summer break. Opening time is 8:45 to 11:45am. If you should find the bins full, please do NOT dump your bottles on the floor – take them home and try again later. #### **CARING FOR OUR ELDERLY**



Easily the oldest building in our village is the church. It's stood here for many centuries. It's been the scene of tears of joy at countless weddings and tears of sadness at innumerable funerals. It has echoed to the sound of babies and children, of choirs and organs. It has been a place of refuge where anyone can go at any time to share their thoughts and prayers, hopes and fears with their God. It still is all those things and we'd like it to be around for a good while yet. But it is under threat.

The threat doesn't come from blind bureaucracy at 'the centre'. No one in the general Anglican hierarchy or more locally has plans to re-organise our church out of existence or to close it. On the contrary, everyone responsible for it at every level wants it to flourish. But the simple fact is that it costs more to keep it open than the weekly congregation can afford.

Parish share (what we pay to the diocese as our proportion of paying and housing our clergy), heating, lighting, insurance, maintenance and myriad smaller bills all add up to more than the faithful few in the pews can contribute. External fundraising events: fetes, race nights, 200 clubs, quizzes, all help. But there is still a gap.

Before you reach for your pen or keyboard to demand to know why the wealthy Church of England or the government doesn't pay for the upkeep of our church, here are a couple of facts. The Church of England *is* wealthy but the money its capital earns each year goes to pay for the training of the clergy of tomorrow, for the pensions of many of the clergy of yesterday, for the upkeep of cathedrals and bishops' staffs and for mission projects around the country. Not, you will note, for the upkeep of individual churches. Government support is largely confined to waiving VAT on some maintenance bills. So responsibility for the 16,000 or so local churches rests, *as it almost always has*, with local communities.

When there is a need for a capital sum to repair the roof or porch or to install a toilet or automate the clock or replace the pews with chairs, the local community responds with overwhelming generosity. And there are capital grants to help with these things too. But, meanwhile, the drip-drip of ongoing regular financial commitments is wearing away the stone represented by the faithful people who make up the body of the Church.

Could you help? You may only go to church very occasionally or perhaps not at all. But you may value the church for its heritage and for what it still represents. You may have relations lying in the churchyard; perhaps a son or daughter was baptised or married in the church; maybe you have popped in on occasion to reflect or to have a word with God. In the near future a leaflet outlining ways in which you can contribute financially to your church should be in your hands. Please read it, consider its message and act on it if you can.

We do the best we can for our elderly folk even though we know they probably won't be with us for much longer. With the best we can do for our church it will be around for many years to come, still offering everything it did in the past to us and to future generations.

Penny and Harry Marsden moved to Bletchingdon with their two small children (David and Sally) in 1953. They had more or less completed turning 'Cottage Row' (a row of 5 tiny cottages destined for demolition in the Islip Road) into one house, Quincotts, their dream home. Penny was a home maker and family was everything to her. It wasn't long before their family grew to fill the house with two more children (Robert and Nicholas). She was a tireless housewife, mother and gardener and as Harry turned half the huge garden into a wonderful vegetable plot, Penny turned the other half into a beautiful flower garden, with orchard and secret paths and places for the children to hide.

Penny loved living in Bletchingdon. As the children grew older, she and Harry threw themselves into helping organise Church fetes and Bazaars. Harry was Church Warden for many years and Penny, a Sidesman.

After Harry's death in 1997, Penny continued to help with church flowers and cleaning, often seen buzzing around in her mini, visiting family and friends, or delivering (and organising) Meals-on-Wheels. She was thrilled to see that a new village hall and school were being built and went to all the meetings, highlighting the need for safe road crossings. She enjoyed going to lunch at the Blacks Head, especially when Jane was landlady, and enjoyed meeting old friends from the village there.

Bletchingdon was very dear to her and central to her life. As Penny grew older, her memory and health began to fail, she went to live at Wytham care home, where she enjoyed the fun and activities, until it was time to say goodbye to the world and meet Harry again.

# OXFORDSHIRE COUNTY COUNCIL – SHARED LIVES ABBIE'S STORY

"It's just such a lovely thing to do" – how being a shared lives carer can be something the whole family can enjoy

For Abbie and Sam Clayton, who live in Wallingford in South Oxfordshire, being a shared lives carer is part of their DNA.

Sam grew up sharing his family home with people with additional needs through the shared lives scheme. The innovative programme, run by Oxfordshire County Council, carefully matches adults with long term conditions with a caring household who can support them to live independently, often giving their full time carers a chance to take a break. And having seen what a positive experience the programme brought to his life, Sam and his wife Abbie wanted the same for their children.

Abbie said: "It's great to have more people in the family. Rather than detracting from the children, it makes them appreciate diversity. It's nice to see them growing up in an environment where they can provide that caring role as well. It really gives something back."

Abbie and Sam have been shared lives carers for 17 years, helping to support eight people during that time. The paid position comes with regular ongoing support and training, enabling them to feel confident that they're providing an environment for their guests to flourish.

Abbie continues: "The most rewarding thing is seeing people grow and develop into the people they become, pushing them that extra mile to really be independent and experience life as part of the family. We get as much training as we need, especially around recognising each person as an individual. We have a really open communication with the shared lives team when we need it and other carers as well, so support is always available."

Shared Lives carers come from all walks of life, from different backgrounds and live in all kinds of homes. Around the UK, over 9,000 Shared Lives carers open their homes and hearts to someone who needs support after hospital treatment, for mental ill health, dementia, learning disability, older age or for young people leaving care. In Oxfordshire, there are around 100 shared lives households offering short stays, support for a few hours a day, or somewhere to live longer term. Shared Lives carers receive a fee based on the level of support they offer, rent and bills, in return for including someone in their home and community life.

150 Shared Lives services – including the programme run through Oxfordshire County Council - carefully match people together based on interests in common, lifestyle and personalities. People can visit or live with a Shared Lives carers for a few weeks, or many years. Shared Lives care is consistently rated the best quality and safest form of care across the UK – 96% rated good or outstanding by the Care Quality Commission.

#### **KIRTLINGTON MORRIS**

Not surprisingly I have little to report of Kirtlington Morris activities over the summer as our ongoing lack of members has very much affected what we are able to do. Apart from organizing a very successful Lamb Ale Morris Festival, we were at least able to dance out twice: once on our own at the King's Arms in Kidlington, and once with Eynsham Morris and other sides at the Mason's Arms in North Leigh.

But since Kirtlington finally and officially went 'mixed' in the spring we managed to get a few practices in with women recruits before the summer break, and by the time you read this we will have resumed practice (on Tuesday 26<sup>th</sup> September) and hope to be joined by more. No experience necessary, all genders, come singly or as a couple (or as a group!), 8pm Tuesdays at Kirtlington Village Hall. The more of us there are, the more we will be able to do next year.

And don't forget the social side; we always go for a beer after practice, currently at the King's Arms in Kidlington, a few minutes' drive away.

### **History Corner**

#### **Edward the Confessor – our local King**

Edward the Confessor was born just three miles away from Bletchington in the village of Islip, circa 1003. He was the son of King Ethelred the Unready who reigned between 978 and 1016 and Emma of Normandy. The name 'Confessor' refers to his pious nature (he was canonised in 1161). The family was exiled in France briefly in 1013 following a Danish invasion, but returned and Ethelred was reinstated as King until 1016 when the Danes, under Canute, seized control. Exiled again, Edward did not return until 1041 when Canute's son, Hardecanute, had become King. The two ruling factions were now integrated as Hardecanute, like Edward, was a son of Emma of Normandy, thus they were half-brothers. In ill health and unmarried with no known children, Hardecanute is believed to have invited Edward to be his successor. Emma may well have influenced this arrangement, in order to retain her own power by continuing to have one of her sons on the throne.

Edward reigned between 1042 and 1066 and is credited with restoring the rule of the House of Wessex, a dynasty dating back more than 200 years and included, amongst others, King Alfred the Great. Edward's coronation was at Winchester Cathedral on Easter Sunday, 1043. A significant event of Edward's reign was the construction of Westminster Abbey, which commenced between 1042 and 1052 as a royal burial church. It was consecrated in 1065, shortly before Edward's death, but was not completed until 1090. It remained in situ until 1245 when Henry III had it demolished, to be replaced by the new building which remains to this day.

Edward is often described by historians as an ineffective monarch, having to maintain good relations with powerful earls, notably Godwin, Earl of Wessex, but he managed to retain the crown and preserved the dignity of the monarchy over his 24 year reign. Edward's marriage to Edith of Wessex, daughter of Godwin in 1045 brough him closer to the Godwins, but it was always an uneasy alliance with that family. Godwin was arguably the most powerful person in the country and, upon his death in 1053, this position of power was assumed by his son, Harold Godwinson.

When Edward died early 1066, he left no direct heir but, amongst several potential claimants of the crown, it was inevitably taken by Harold Godwinson (Harold II) on the basis of family ties, being Edward's brother-in-law. Whether this was ever Edward's intention is open to debate – the Godwin's were a constant thorn in his side, but he may have reluctantly become reconciled to the idea that they would one day succeed him. William of Normandy (the Conqueror), a distant cousin, however, had other ideas, claiming Edward had promised the throne to him, again a matter open to historical debate. In October of 1066, William's conquest of England proved decisive.



# Into Battle! New exhibition explores the art and history of the best of British war comics


*Into Battle: The Art of British War Comics* will open to visitors at Soldiers of Oxfordshire Museum, Woodstock, from 1<sup>st</sup> October 2023 to 30<sup>th</sup> April 2024.

The county's military history museum is collaborating with Oxford-based Rebellion Publishing on the new exhibition which will offer visitors a chance to explore the history of British war comics through the archives of classic comic titles such as *War Picture Library* and *Battle Action*. Hugely popular today, Britain has been publishing comics continuously for over 130 years. During that time, conflict has remained a staple of comic book storytelling and by the 1960s and 1970s war stories were the most popular genre.

The exhibition, featuring original comic artwork on public display for the first time, tells the story of war comics decade by decade. From satirical comic strips and patriotic illustrated story papers of 19<sup>th</sup> Century and early 20<sup>th</sup> Century, to the revolutionary comics of the 1970s, which presented much more gritty, authentic and emotionally-charged stories.

Long-time readers of comics will be given a nostalgic look back at some of their favourites, while younger and more recent fans will gain an insight into how their favourite medium has developed over the years. Battle Action, which Rebellion have recently revived with the work of renowned comic writers and artists such as Garth Ennis (*Preacher, The Boys*), Keith Burns (Commando Comics, *Johnny Red*) and Dab Abnett (Warhammer 40k, Marvel Comics) features heavily throughout. The comic, which was known as Battle Picture Weekly before merging with Action comics in 1977, notably featured the series *Charley's War* by Pat Mills and Jo Colquhoun - regarded as one of the greatest war comics of all time. Following its working-class hero from underage recruit in 1914 through almost every major event of the war, the strip sees Charley lose friends in battle, portraying the human cost of war through the eyes of an ordinary soldier.



The incredible artwork on display will include original 1983 *Charley's War* panels by Mills and Colquhoun, alongside full colour original artwork from Jordi Penalva (*Bulldog Breed*, 1965), Giorgio de Gaspari (*Spy 13*, 1959) and Graham Cotton (*Gun Duel*, 1967). Alongside much to capture the interest and imagination of adults, the exhibition will offer younger visitors the chance to discover how comics are made and have a go at creating comics themselves.

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












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
